education, its first dedicated training
facility in Africa, aimed at boosting
healthcare sector competencies and
supporting a better patient experience. GE
is committed to the expansion of training
services across Africa.

Offering outcome-based healthcare advisory services, technology and analytics expertise, GE Healthcare can support in the design of future state end-to-end patient pathways to improve outcomes and cost for key diseases; optimize care delivery management to increase patient flow, reduce waste and improve the patient experience; and transform culture to deliver operational efficiencies and drive stronger organizational performance. Today, in one of the Middle East's healthcare systems, GE Healthcare Partners eliminated 9,000 hours of administrator paperwork and 36,000 patient waiting hours across 12 Emergency Departments.

With tremendous strides being taken to transform healthcare at every level across the continent, healthcare providers are focused on driving meaningful improvements across several fronts. From upgrading and modernizing the healthcare infrastructure and combating the rise of non-communicable disease, to training and education for healthcare professionals; governments, the private sector and industry alike, are together committed to supporting better patient-outcomes for all Africans.

GE is committed to increasing access to affordable and quality healthcare through its \$6B global healthymagination initiative and is proud to have been selected as a strategic partner by several Ministries of Health and private healthcare providers in supporting the delivery of critical healthcare development programs across Africa.

Some of GE's work in healthcare across the continent:

In Algeria

- As announced by the Algerian Ministry
 of Health (MoH) in October 2013, GE
 was selected as a strategic partner to
 support the government's plan to improve
 healthcare services, with a performance
 improvement program aimed at improving
 operating efficiencies now underway.
- GE Healthcare is also working with several key private partners to accelerate cancer care in the country.

In Egypt

• In Egypt, GE is supporting the MoH with the development of a centralized image

repository for the country, enabling hospitals to send, share and store xray images to facilitate remote assessment by radiologists, addressing critical clinical and operational challenges facing many hospitals in the emerging markets.

In Nigeria

- GE Healthcare in April 2012 signed a landmark strategic Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) agreement with the MoH in Nigeria to explore key initiatives and partnerships in critical healthcare development areas.
- With a focus on advancing healthcare

transformation in the area of capacity building and infrastructure enhancements, GE Healthcare in 2013 collaborated to commission three new Diagnostic Imaging Centers and delivered education and training in seven A&E hospitals across the country. GE also partnered to design the first-ever Paramedic Curriculum approved by the National Council on Health.

 In line with MDGs 4 & 5, GE is actively partnering with the government of Nigeria to introduce ultrasound usage and taskshifting training for ante-natal care, in support of the Save One Million Lives initiative. The program aims to support mothers and babies throughout Nigeria especially in rural/low-resource settings, with a focus on improving the quality of care by 2015.

In Kenya

- In May 2012, GE signed a strategic MoU with the Government of Keyna to explore partnership opportunities in several areas including healthcare, in line with the country's Vision 2030.
- In November 2012, with a focus on advancing surgical care in Africa, GE
 Healthcare chose Kenya as the global
 launch site for GE's Carestation 30
 anesthesia delivery system. GE also
 introduced globally for the first time in
 Kenya, the Safe Surgery Clinical Training
 Program supported by the Kenya Society
 of Anaesthesiology in partnership with the
 National Association of Anesthesia Clinical
 Officers. The program has today trained
 more than 130 professionals across Kenya.
- In December 2013, Vanderbilt University in the United States announced that it

- received a US\$3 million grant from the GE Foundation's Developing Health Globally program to fund international medical education and research in Kenya and other low-resource regions of the world. The scheme will focus on the development of training programs that can demonstrably lower surgical and obstetric mortality, as well as dramatically improve and expand education of anesthesia providers in these regions.
- Most recently, in January 2014, GE,
 USAID and the Kenya Commercial Bank
 announced a first-of-its-kind collaboration
 for the development of SME healthcare
 in Kenya through a scheme to provide up
 to \$10 million in local financing for the
 development of private health facilities
 including doctor partnerships, diagnostic
 centers and hospitals in Kenya.

In Tanzania

• In partnership with the Ifakara Health Institute of Tanzania, GE is working to provide access to portable ultrasound and trainings on these devices to midwives and nurses. The program is aimed at making ultrasound services available for pregnant women in rural Tanzania and thus increase reach in remote areas. Reinforcing this commitment, GE in 2013 donated US \$85k in handheld ultrasound devices and related equipment to the Kisarawe District Hospital, in the Pwani District of Tanzania.

In Ghana

 In June 2013, GE signed an MoU with the Ghana MoH to support the development of quality healthcare in the country.
 Under the agreement, the MoH and GE are exploring three potential areas for collaboration, including the introduction of GE's handheld portable ultrasound into Ghana's Community-based Health Planning and Services in support of MDGs 4 & 5; the development of diagnostic centers of excellence through Private Public Partnerships and a focus on training and capacity building.


In Ethiopia

With the support of a grant from USAID
 and in partnership with the Ethiopian
 Pediatrics Society, GE is evaluating patient
 outcomes in maternal and infant care
 through the introduction of technology
 and training solutions for midwives
 and newborn care. This effort is aimed
 at scaling up capacity and supporting
 access to improved care across regions in
 Ethiopia.

In South Africa

- In February 2014, GE announced the donation of US\$1 million to support the Nelson Mandela Children's Fund. The donation will help fulfil Mandela's lasting wish for improved child healthcare in Southern Africa and will contribute towards ongoing efforts to further develop much needed healthcare facilities including the Nelson Mandela Children's Hospital.
- GE also partnered with the eThekwini hospital and heart centre, the country's first black-empowered hospital, to equip it with world-class cardiology and imaging equipment.
